Tonk Talk by Mark T. Tonkery

One of the very negative effects of the COVID-19 pandemic is the closing of several congregations. Since the pandemic began, I know of at least four congregations that have permanently closed their doors. I know of a few other congregations that have not opened back up and there are some doubts if they will ever open their doors again.



Although I hope it never happens our current situation has made me ask the question, "if our congregation disappeared, would anyone notice? Who would miss us if our congregation would stop meeting permanently?

Now it is true there are those who will not miss our congregation, for example Satan and those who work for Satan will not miss our congregation, in fact, they would be delighted if we were not here. There may be even some in our community who would not miss our being here for one reason or another.

But there might be some who would miss us, for example, those who use our food pantry, come to our clothing and school supply give away. Then I think about the works the church support such as missionaries in different parts of the world, the young men we are helping, who are training to be preachers, and the children's homes we support as a congregation, all would miss us if we were to disappear. Then I think about the families who have been raised in the congregation for generations, and the new converts. This is where many of them were baptized, had their weddings, and some even can remember having a dear loved one's funeral here. Surely, these families would miss the congregation if it were no longer here.

But what would be missed the most if this congregation quit meeting? Wouldn't it be the preaching of the gospel of Jesus Christ, sharing the gospel light? Who would carry the gospel message into this community? Where would one go to hear about Christ and His plan of salvation? Some might argue, "well we would just go to the church across town," and although we are blessed with many faithful congregations in our area, I know some people would be lost if the church was not in this community. In each congregation I have worked with there were members in that congregation who became a member just because the church was there. They would not have been a member of the church had it not been established in that location.

In Revelations 1:20 it compares each congregation to a lampstand, and Jesus also tells us in Mt. 5:14 we are the light of the world. This being true we must realize the influence we have in this community, to light the way of Christ, and if we not here to share the light of Christ, who will?

Maybe we can think about it in this way: imagine a dark room with candles that are burning. The more candles in the room the brighter the room, and the better one can see to move around in the room. But when the candle is extinguished, the room becomes darker, making it harder to see and move around in the room.

Now think of each congregation as a candle (light) as each congregation closes its doors, the world only gets darker. Although Jesus promises in Mat 16:18, "...I will build my church, and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it." (Meaning the church will never be destroyed or nonexistent on earth), it does not mean the local congregation cannot disappear. After all many, if not all the congregation mentioned in the New Testament have disappeared, (Corinth, Antioch, Ephesus, etc.) yet the church Christ built remains.

If our congregation disappeared, would anyone notice? Are we shining the light of Christ?

Expensive Junk and Free Treasure

The zeal with which people will pursue the toy that their kid wants most for Christmas is astounding. Every year seems to have a new fad – a new massively hard to purchase toy. A few years ago it was "Shopkins" (tiny collectable rubber toys). When stores sold out parents flocked to eBay and spent thousands of dollars to get them. Retail price: four dollars. Anyone who went to a store on Black Friday may very well have experienced the same kind of passion. And for what? I suspect in most cases those little Shopkins dolls got eaten by the dog or ended up in the trash.

What is interesting to me is trying to figure out where this fiery passion really comes from. My guess is that something in people's lives feels empty and the goal becomes to fill that void with stuff. People are thirsty and hungry without really knowing what they are hungry for. Nothing satisfies for long, even if it was four digits on eBay. I would encourage people to take to heart these words from Isaiah: "Come, all you who are thirsty, come to the waters; and you who have no money, come, buy and eat! Come, buy wine and milk without money and without cost. Why spend money on what is not bread, and your labor on what does not satisfy? Listen, listen to me, and eat what is good, and your soul will delight in the richest of fare. Give ear and come to me; hear me, that your soul may live" (Isaiah 55:1-3).

You might not be able to afford this year's latest fad. But guess what? You don't need it. What you really need you can get by the grace of God. Can you imagine the line if Wal-Mart started handing out free Nintendo game systems? It would be crazy! God is giving out something much better than that. Why spend all your efforts on bread that isn't really bread? Why spend your money on a drink that won't quench your thirst? Come to God and He will give you what is good. He will give you the richest of fare, food that will make your soul thrive. And God won't charge you a dime.

Did you see that Geico commercial with Jerome Bettis? Geico was saying it's easy to get help with their insurance - just as easy as playing flag football with this massive retired professional football player. He basically ran over the entire opposing side while his team just stood around. I'm not built for football - but if I had Jerome Bettis on my side I'd win anyway. Resuming Bible Classes

It has been months since we have had Bible classes meeting at Camden Avenue church of Christ. The COVID-19 situation has taken a toll on us all. Please think of everyone's safety as it concerns our classes and worship services. If you are well, we look forward to seeing you in Bible classes.
