Doug's Discussion

<u>Fighting Sin . . . and Raccoons</u>

I never thought I would ever say this . . . but I got into a fight with a raccoon today. The rotten thief took advantage of our absence during Lads to Leaders and decided our cat's outdoor home and larger-than-usual supply of cat food looked rather inviting. He showed up, ate all the cat food, and went to sleep on my cat's blanket. This just wasn't a situation that could continue! My wife and I had an initial plan where I would carry the cat box to the stairs, leaving the deck so I could gently tip the house and shoo him out. Instead, after being picked up, the raccoon left the house and went for my leg. Apparently animal squatters get cranky when being evicted. Fortunately, my wife was ready with the garden hose, and he was redirected off the premises. The bandit heard "AND DON'T COME BACK!" on his way out. Hopefully, he tells his friends.

This was my first fight with a raccoon, not my first fight with something that tried to take up residence in my life that shouldn't be there. Not my first fight with something that threatened to consume what was good and bring misery to those around me. "In the same way, count yourselves dead to sin but alive to God in Christ Jesus. Therefore do not let sin reign in your mortal body so that you obey its evil desires . . . For sin shall not be your master" (Romans 6:11-14). I know that living a life guided by righteousness is a wonderful life. I know that, but sin is always trying to creep in. And sometimes I look to heaven and proclaim along with Paul, "I do not understand what I do. For what I want to do I do not do, but what I hate I do" (Romans 7:14). When that sin does creep in it tries to take up residence in my mind and in my heart. Eventually the power of that sin is the guide to my decisions, not a devotion to the Lord. The easy thing to do would be to just let it live there. But this is not a situation that can continue!

I humbly suggest that it is always good to do a little self-examination to search for what shouldn't be in our lives. "But if we judged ourselves, we would not come under judgment" (1 Corinthians 11:31). Just as a nasty raccoon can do a fair bit of damage in just a couple of days, sin can do quite a bit more. It has to go. Not later . . . now. And after you kick whatever that sin is out of your life, feel free to yell: "AND DON'T COME BACK!" After all, you are dead to sin but alive to God in Christ Jesus. Remember that. And . . . watch out for that raccoon.

<u>Fostering Selfless Unity in the Church:</u> <u>Following Jesus' Example</u>

Being selfless is not only denying yourself but also taking action by following Jesus in unselfish ways. "Then Jesus said to His disciples, 'If anyone desires to come after Me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross, and follow Me" (Matthew 16:24 NKJV). Taking up your cross is the willingness to bear a burden we would not initially desire but do so unselfishly, following after Jesus. Fortunately, we are asked to take up our own cross when Jesus carries the cross for the world.

Today, those of us in the church make up Christ's body (Ephesians 1:22-23; Colossians 1:24). This body of Christ is supposed to be active in many suitable activities with the same God (1 Corinthians 12:6). When a body loses its ability to remain active it begins to die. Our faith is like this, too. Without the works of our faith, our faith will die (James 2:26). A congregation that stops working does so because its members have stopped working. Their dead faith spreads as a disease to others in the body as a cancer.

One particular activity of the body of Christ is to remain unified in Christ. "Now I plead with you, brethren, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that you all speak the same thing, and that there be no divisions among you, but that you be perfectly joined together in the same mind and in the same judgment" (1 Corinthians 1:10).

This is a work of edification to remain and work towards unity of faith (Ephesians 4:13-14). The church at Corinth was on its way to becoming disorganized by departing from the unity of Christ. Strife and envy had begun to boil over because of the brewing divisions and lack of unity (1 Corinthians 3:3). James tells us, "For where envy and self-seeking exist, confusion and every evil thing are there (James 3:16). "Every evil thing" is the product of not being unified.

The call to prioritize others above ourselves is significant within the church family. The apostle Paul's words in Philippians 2:3-4 resonate deeply within the context of our relationships within the church: "Let nothing be done through selfish ambition or conceit, but in lowliness of mind let each esteem others better than himself. Let each of you look out not only for his own interests, but also for the interests of others" (Philippians 2:3-4).

This divine commandment encourages us to foster an atmosphere of selfless love and unity within our church community. It's a call to set aside personal agendas, preferences, and ambitions for the greater good of the body of Christ.

When prioritizing others within our congregation, we imitate Christ's example of sacrificial love. Jesus modeled this selflessness in His interactions with His disciples, teaching them to serve one another and put the needs of others before their own.

Amid differing opinions, diverse backgrounds, and personal goals, prioritizing others becomes a cornerstone of building a robust and unified congregation. It's an intentional choice to esteem the needs and concerns of our fellow brothers and sisters, fostering an environment where everyone in Christ feels valued and supported.

This selfless love driven toward unity in Christ within the church manifests in practical ways—extending grace in moments of disagreement in liberty, actively listening to understand, offering support in times of need, and rejoicing in one another's successes.

As we navigate our relationships within the church, let's echo Christ's sacrificial love. May we lay aside selfish tendencies, embracing a humble posture that seeks the well-being and unity of our church family. By valuing others above ourselves, we reflect the heart of Christ and contribute to a community built on love, grace, and mutual respect.
